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COVID-19 AND NEW YORK STATE:

But, even if the lives saved could have been a fraction of that, what a huge difference it would have made.

I am reminded how, when I sent out issue 2 that I focused on the economic and health effects of the virus as being due to Force Majeure (events of such magnitude that they are out of our control). A couple of readers suggested that I didn't cite that the

administration could have done more, a critique with which I agree, but nonetheless contend that this was just such a virulent virus, the trajectory of which was almost impossible to stop or predict. By the way, a lot of people don't seem to be aware, but it is up to state governors, not the federal government to dictate what procedures should be followed in these type situations. Yes, the federal government can make suggestions, but action is up to the individual states.

So now we're back to New York State. Well, I've heard the Mayor of NYC and the Governor complain about it being such a densely packed area, how could the problem be avoided? Sounds like Force Majeure to me, which I actually believe.
