QUOTE FOR THE DAY:

"All is infection, mother... We shall sit quietly in this room, and I think we'll be spared." Rita Dove, 'Fiammeta Breaks her peace'.

Apparently not a whole lot of folks agreeing with that philosophy today (Minnesota, Michigan, Texas, Virginia, Colorado) – don't know how many more today, but a lot of people convinced the lock downs are just too extreme.

Going back about a week, Texas Lt. Governor, Dan Patrick had this to say, "No one reached out to me and said, 'As a senior citizen are you willing to take a chance on your survival in exchange for keeping the America that all America loves for your children and grandchildren?" The 69 year old Patrick said, "And, if that's the exchange, I'm all in."

I come upon this somewhat troublesome attitude in a recent column by Frank Cerabino entitled, "How low can we go? Killing grandma as an act of patriotism?" He goes on to quote Glenn Beck saying people his age should think of the big picture. "Even if we all get sick, I would rather die than kill the country." Wow! conjures up the picture of lemmings running off the cliff, yes?

But, wait a minute, I think there's a whole different way to look at this situation. It's called "Free will".

Come to find out that Covid- 19 is killing about 1,800 people a day since April 7th, while heart disease takes 1,774 and cancer, 1,641. With similar mortality rates, we're not all locked down by fear of heart disease and cancer. We learn from "Axios AM Deep Dive" by Mike Allen –(just an excellent daily publication, thanks, Joe Knoll) that by the end of March, "57% of mothers and 32% of fathers of children under the age of 18 reported worsening mental health."

Loneliness, domestic violence, financial stress created by the loss of employment all contribute to this toxic stew.

Other cautionary words include a prominent Doctor saying, "People need to realize that it's not safe to play poker wearing bandanas." And,
