MEDICAL CORNER- LET'S TALK YUCK

Highly informative recent article in the NY Times last week by Paula Span on an alternative to our favorite medical procedure, the colonoscopy. It is pointed out that adults up to the age of 75 should be screened regularly, but that there is a very reliable test that can be taken in place of a colonoscopy, which, in any event is not recommended for those over 80, where there are increased risks, just from the test, such as a perforated intestine.

Dr. Alex Krist, Chairman of the U.S.
Preventitive Services task force says, "If your doctor tells you a colonoscopy is better, that's not accurate."

Cologard, the mail in test which we have all seen advertised on TV is OK, but is found to be less effective and much more expensive than FIT (Fecal immune-chemical test) also done with a mailer (no uncomfortable prep- no need to skip work). Obviously, if your report comes back with a warning sign, then you will have to do a colonoscopy. However, this test is said to be highly accurate. Dr. Krist again, "The data show the tests are equally effective at saving lives."

The FIT test costs about \$20, considerably less than Cologard, and a colonoscopy can cost more than \$1,000. I'll have to send this article to my own doctor who still says a colonoscopy is the "gold standard", but knows nothing about the FIT test. The author of the article, Ms. Span, notes, "There's a large financial incentive for people who do colonoscopies to do colonoscopies." – copy that!!
