It's been strengthened, I guess is the best way to say it that I definitely feel more, I feel like the Lord has heard me and I think, thankfully, again, like my, my mom now is better and at home. But even before that, it's just like COVID has the Lord's taken away a lot of distractions with work, and people and events and all that so that you can just spend time with him. And especially when my mom was in the hospital, I didn't have sight for anything besides that in the way of like, let's worship the Lord and pray because I had no control. I have no control; I couldn't do anything. And I felt at a loss, except that I knew that God has a plan, and I'm encouraged, and I know that there's obviously not everyone gets a happy ending. And that came, you know, I had faith with that. And I still knew that the Lord would never leave me or forsake me in that time, whether it be difficult or not.

And especially with my mom in the hospital, I've been able to experience my church family in the way of social media, like support, and we've gotten so many messages and pictures and verses and encouragement in a way that I hadn't really experienced before.
