"SAPIENS" BY Yuval Noah Harari.- non fiction. My selection. First published in 2014, Sapiens has been on the best seller list 97 weeks, most recently,s just this past Sunday. It is a very thought provoking book. I went to see if there might be a concise review that would create better interest on the part of our HH readers than I could elicit, especially since it has been three years since I read it. So what did I find? A five star review by P.Schuyler who says, "I don't do book reviews too often, but this was definitely one of the most important books I have ever read. For me it was a massive shift in perspective that cleared up a lot of confusion I had about history.... The thesis is simple and profound- what makes homo sapiens so different from the rest of the animal kingdom, and why are we so dominant? "

Well all of that is really quite interesting and takes up about the first third of the book- you never knew there were so many sapiens and wannabes. Then comes the hard part where Harari challenges so many of our hardcore beliefs described as the "Fictions" of homo sapiens. Schuyler goes on to comment, "So

what are these fictions? They are our languages, our gods, our nations, our corporations and much more. Money is a kind of shared fiction that establishes trust. Brands and companies are fictional inventions and so are religious or philosophical ideologies and idols. Our most cherished rituals and beliefs that we assume to be 'true' are the most powerful of all our Fictions."

Where Harari takes the reader with these various topics is spell binding and from what you just read of Schuyler's review might lead you to think Harari is an atheist or agnostic. I honestly don't know, but I caution against drinking the Harari cool aide. He is described as being from a secular jewish family. I know the Rector of my old prep school would not have the book on the summer reading list, nor would any Catholic High School. Regardless, Harari will get you contemplating things you have never thought about before. The range of topics is astonishing. We are even exposed to how we raise animals and fowl for food-could turn you into a vegan pretty quickly. In my opinion- a dare to read book- you'll learn a lot, but also, question a lot of what you read.

"TALKING TO STRANGERS" by Malcolm Gladwell- non fiction- also on this week's best seller list. Some of you will remember Gladwell as the author of "The Tipping Point" and "Blink". This is another of my selections. Gladwell's purpose is to point out a lot of inane things people have done which he posits is the result of not knowing how to talk to strangers. He points out how Fidel Castro fooled the CIA for a generation. Why did Neville Chamberlain think he could trust Hitler? How did Bernie Madoff get away with his deceptions for so long?

So Gladwell would have you believe that the tools and strategies we use to make sense of people just don't work. As he keeps reiterating this point throughout the book, I found myself disagreeing more and more. What he fails to address is that chapter from Psychology 101, "You perceive what you want to perceive" There is an aspect of that that applies to every chapter he writes and yet, he seems to miss it. I found this a good read ,and it was kind of fun finding myself at odds with a highly acclaimed author, especially since I might be right. But

then, I'm probably perceiving what I want to perceive.

"APROPOS OF NOTHING" By Woody Allenautobiography. Do not read this book, but do read the review by Dwight Garner- "Books on the Times". Of course the talented Allen has self destructed and, in my mind should be shunned, but this review is really good. Garner is so readable, starting off with, "Volunteering to review this book in our moral climate is akin to volunteering for the 2021 Olympic javelin-catching team....My wife and daughter stared at me as if I had announced my intention to find the nearest functioning salad bar and lick the sneeze guard."
