
Defeating the Defeating the Ministers Death Prof. David Isaacs

Professor David Isaacs is a consultant paediatrician at the Children's Hospital at Westmead, Sydney, and Clinical Professor in Paediatric Infectious Diseases at the University of Sydney. He has been a member of every Australian national immunisation advisory committee for the last 25 years. He is passionate about bioethics, and has published and taught extensively on ethical aspects of immunisation.

Elizabeth Finkel (AM) is a former biochemist who switched to journalism. She co-founded Cosmos Magazine, served as Editor in Chief (2013 - 2018) and is now Editor at Large. She has published two books: Stem Cells (2005) which won the Queensland Premier's Literary Award, and The Genome Generation (2012). Elizabeth's work is regularly anthologised in Best Australian Science Writing. Her journalism has earned her numerous awards. membership of the Order of Australia, and in 2019, a medal by the Australian Society for Medical Research.

In 2012, she left the Hasidic world to explore a self-determined life. **Dassi Erlich** is an advocate for child sex abuse survivors and has led the international campaign to bring Malka Leifer, the former principal of Adass Israel School in Melbourne, to justice. Dassi Erlich grew up in Melbourne's segregated ultra-Orthodox Adass community and only transitioned away within the past 10 years. She is currently writing a book about her journey.
