Tribal Council and Tribal Administration Update

The Tribal Council and tribal administration have been very active during this time and is managing the tribal business activities as they arise and they continue to have weekly business meetings. The business meetings have been handled through teleconferencing and so far this is working out well. We will update the tribal membership weekly via our website at: www.bishoppaiutetribe.org. Go to the tribal member section to review the minutes of these weekly meetings. We will also have portions of the weekly meetings broadcast on our radio station, KBPT-LP, KBPT 96.1

Following are the activities the tribal council has taken since end of February 2020, the majority in the sense of resolutions:

March 10, 2020 Passed Resolution T2020-21 Tribal Heritage Grant and National Park Services for the Cultural Center and Tribal Historic Preservation Office (Tara and Monty).

March 10, 2020 Passed Resolution T2020-22 First Nations Native Youth and Cultural Fund for the Cultural Center and Tribal Historic Preservation Office (Tara and Monty).

March 17, 2020 Passed Resolution T2020-23 To Recommend self-quarantine for Bishop Paiute Tribal Members and Bishop Paiute Tribal Employees who fall under high-risk populations related to the COVID-19 outbreak.

March 17, 2020 - Bishop Paiute Tribal Council declared a State of Emergency effective Tuesday, March 17, 2020 with the adoption of Council Resolution T2020-24 for the Bishop Paiute Reservation in response to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) global pandemic.

March 17, 2020 Bishop Paiute Tribal Council motioned to temporarily close the Paiute Palace Casino for the safety of the community and team members at the Paiute Palace Casino through the end of March 31, 2020. An evaluation and decision of re-opening will be made at or around March 30, 2020.

March 19, 2020 – Bishop Paiute Tribe Emergency Response Plan to the COVID-19 was approved.

- A separate Bishop Paiute Gas Station COVID-19 Protocol was approved.

March 20, 2020 – In response to COVID-19, the Bishop Paiute Tribal Council approved the closure of the Bishop Paiute Tribal Offices and Construction Projects until the end of March 2020. An evaluation and decision of re-opening will be made at or around March 30, 2020.

March 24, 2020 – After review of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers and contractor guidance in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Bishop Paiute Tribal Council approved to re-instate the construction projects with all precautions as outlined in the contractor guidance and CDC recommendations in place effective immediately.

March 24, 2020 Passed Resolution T2020-24 - To Proclaim an emergency declaration of the public threat due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic for the Bishop Reservation.

March 24, 2020 Passed Resolution T2020-25 to Approve the State of California Proposed Voluntary Resolution Referencing the Disease Commonly Referred to as COVID-19.

March 31, 2020 – T2020-26 Approve submission to North American Native Fishes Association – Gerald C. Corcoran Education Grant Program – for EMO

The Bishop Paiute Tribal Council is keenly aware of the decisions they have made and the protections that have been put in place for our membership from this deadly virus (COVID-19). The impacts to one of our most valuable resources of revenue, the Paiute Palace Casino, will have an obvious effect on tribal operations, which includes per capita.

Throughout the past several weeks there have been numerous teleconferences in which each of the tribal council and tribal administration have joined at one level or another. Many of the calls revolve around legislation in which tribal governments are eligible for funding during and in response to the COVID-19. For example:

- -Tribal Administration and Public Works California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) & FEMA.
- -Tribal Council and Administration majority of conference calls are legislative with Department of Interior, US Treasury and numerous consultants.
- Vice-Chairman Denver DHHS, Secretary Tribal Advisory Committee (STAC); ACF, Tribal Advisory Committee (TAC); CA Dept. of Social Services, Tribal Advisory Committee, CA Tribal Nations Grant Fund Panel with Governor Newsome's Office.

Bishop Paiute Tribe Department Updates

In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Bishop Paiute Tribe continues to be fully operational. Bishop Paiute Tribe continues to encourage social distancing practices by keeping our offices closed to the public with a possible reopening of May 4, 2020. We continue to maintain low numbers of essential staff in the office and are promoting the ability of staff to work from home.



Irrigation Season 2020 Update

We hope everyone is healthy and staying safe during these uncertain times. We are right in the middle of Springtime. With the temperatures starting to warm up and the days begin to grow longer, it is refreshing to see the start of the Irrigation Season. The season began Wednesday April 1, 2020 bringing the irrigation infrastructure into full operation. We will run in full operation throughout the next 7 months ending October 31, 2020.

The first month always starts off slow to prevent accidental flooding and to ensure that the system is operating without any issues. After the first one or two rounds we will increase the flows accordingly. Irrigation will be operating 7 days a week 24 hours a day and will continue to keep the community informed and updated. You will see Public Works staff throughout the reservation during regular business hours and at times into the evening. They are available to answer any questions you may have. 2020 Tuhidda na Koinui - ti Program

Recap:

On January 21, 2020: The Bishop Paiute Tribal Council signed a historic Agreement with California Department of Fish and Wildlife. This MOA reflects the understanding that the Bishop Paiute Tribe and CDFW exercise their own unique authorities to protect wildlife resources. CDFW recognized that this government-to-government agreement is a productive and efficient way to honor the Tribe's effort to preserve its culture and well-being through the Tribe's tradition of hunting mule deer (genus *Odocoileus*).

The Agreement identifies the process for the Tribe to take up to twelve (12) deer for individual take and up to four (4) deer for cultural education purposes per year. The Bishop Paiute Tribe will have applications available on June 22, 2020 in the Reception area. As a reminder, all applicants are required to submit their application with their draw status. CDFW applicants may look up their drawing results around the third week of June (6/15/20 - 6/19/20) by entering their customer information on CDFW's website at www.ca.wildlifelicense.com/ InternetSales and click on "View My Draw Application/Preference Points" at the top of the page, then print draw results and submit along with Tribal application.

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to disrupt our way of life, we are determined to honor the following deadlines:

- ⇒ Application submission: 7/17/2020
- \Rightarrow Tribal Lottery: 7/24/2020

If any changes are made within the Tribe or CDFW due to COVID-19, we will notify the Tribal community at our earliest convenience.

Children and Technology

1. Relationships and Social Skills Issues

Kids are using mobile devices more and more, and they can become addicted to this, not spending enough time with their family and/or friends. They are more likely to be virtually connected with friends and have trouble with friendships and relationships in real life.



The new generation is growing up playing games online, accessing websites (sometimes harmful websites), chatting online on Facebook, sharing photos on Instagram and Snapchat and so on. It doesn't mean that spending time online is a bad thing, but spending too much time online can really weaken the bond between the parents and the child.

2. Health Problems

The overuse of mobile devices can be harmful to children's health. The more they use mobile devices, the less physical activities they do. The problem is that playing games online is combined with snacking, substituting the balanced alimentation. As children spend more time in front of those screens, most of the time on the couch, less time they spend outside playing, running and burning off calories. Over time, those habits can lead to a significant weight gain. To prevent it from becoming a habit, parents can talk with their children about parental controls and use Screen Guide App to balance screen time or use a timer so lessen screen time. Remember: it's important to balance the quality and quantity of the time they spend on digital devices. Technology can have an impact on children's speech. Children have had a hard time focusing at school because their use to the vivid, instant gratifications that video games cause.

3. Browsing Online Can Be Dangerous

While browsing online we often face harmful things such as phishing, virus and other dangers disguised as advertising. Most of the adults know it and can easily avoid them, but what about our children? Sometimes even the advert can be harmless to them. A study from 2005 says that 70% of teens aged between 15-17 have accidentally stumbled across pornography online. What about nowadays?

The children can go online and search for anything. But with the right monitoring, they will not access dangers websites, avoiding to meet dangerous people. Keep in mind that you can always guide your children to avoid those dangers.

One way to help children to be safe online is to use parental controls and Internet filtering tools to select the content they are able to access or even block browsers for as long as you consider it is appropriated.

4. Mobile Device Overuse Reduce Sleep Quality

According to the article "Kids Are Being Kept Awake by Their Phones Even When They're Not Using Them" over 72% of all children have at least one device in their bedroom. JAMA Pediatrics published a study with the big question: Is there an association between screen-based media device access or use in the sleep environment, and sleep quantity and quality?

Well, they found out that there is a strong and consistent evidence of a link between mobile devices overuse and reduced sleep quality. Our children are sleeping less than they should, but what's the matter with it?

A lack of sleep can have serious consequences on our brain. During the sleep, the brain does some "housekeeping" tasks, clearing things that aren't important and restoring the nerves networks to wake up again ready for a brand new day. But sleeping less means that we're depriving our brain of its essential needs and we will struggle on our activities during the day.

5. Is Your Smartphone Affecting Your Relationship With Your Kids?

Take a time to think about it, have you checked your phone for notifications how many times? How many times did you open WhatsApp, WeChat, Facebook, or Instagram when you're with your children? Well, most of the people we know, do this many times, after all, mobile devices are great to overcome boredom. But checking out mobile devices for notifications when we're around children has its downsides. According to a study published by University of Michigan Health System, "Parents' use of mobile technology around young children may be causing internal tension, conflicts and negative interactions with their kids".

Children see, children do. Dr. Jenny Radesky, says that children "...learn by watching us how to have a conversation, how to read other people's facial expressions. And if that's not happening, children are missing out on important development milestones." For more information: ScreenGuide.com

Use ScreenGuide Parental Control App to balance your child's screen time and spend more offline time with them. Take the time to be with them, and do the stressful tasks later, when you're not with your children.

World Hemophilia Day 2020

Friday, April 17. 2020 Wear Red for World Hemophilia Day

My Name is Raymond Garcia, I am 5 Years old and I am a Bishop Paiute Tribal Member and I have Hemophilia Severe A. I am missing Factor 8 and my mom gives me infusions at home 3 times a week. On Friday April 17th I ask my community to wear red for World Hemophilia Day and show support and bring awareness of Hemophilia and the bleeding disorder community. World Hemophilia day is an International day of observance set by the World Federation of Hemophilia to raise awareness for Hemophilia and bleeding disorders.

Hemophilia is a rare Genetic Bleeding Disorder that prevents the blood from clotting normally. People with Hemophilia are missing an important protein needed for clotting blood. People with Hemophilia bleed easily and the bleed takes longer to clot. People with hemophilia can experience internal bleeding and often painful, swollen joints due to bleeding into the joints. There is currently no cure for Hemophilia but there are treatments where Factor is given to replace the missing proteins letting people with Hemophilia live long, healthy, normal lives. Hemophilia affects 1 in 5,000 Male Births, and Raymond is the only one with Hemophilia in Inyo and Mono Counties.

The Bishop Paiute Tribal Court welcomes Ambroshia Stone, as the new Tribal Court Project Coordinator



How-Muh, Nu Ambroshia Stone, Me-na-ne-uh. Nu yatu Cu-Ui watuu. Hello, my name is Ambroshia Stone, I am member of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe of Pyramid Lake, Nevada. I was born and raised here in the Owens Valley, with time away having served in the U.S. NAVY. This includes 2 deployments; WESTPAC, Iraq and Afghanistan. After my honorable discharge, I then completed my degree in Social Sciences with a minor in Criminal Justice. When returning home to the Owens Valley, I worked for the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Education Center in their Administration Department and later began employment with The

Owens Valley Career Development Center as a Case Counselor, Tribal TANF for 3 years and a Site Manager, Tribal TANF for 2 years. During that time, I also self-contracted as a Qualified Expert Witness (QEW) for American Indian families, custody/guardianship cases here in the Inyo County. As of January 2020, I have re-enrolled for my 2nd degree program in Criminal Justice with a focus on Court procedures and protocol as well as Project Management through Southern New Hampshire University. As the new Tribal Court Project Coordinator for the Bishop Paiute Tribe, I am thankful and excited to take on a new position and hope to serve in this position to the best of my abilities.
